Drawing Lace is the new exhibition at the Thelma Hulbert Gallery in Honiton.

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Council Offices
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Post Office closures

1. A recent history of Post Office Ltd:

- ❑ In the mid 1980s Post Office Ltd was created as a separate company in the Royal Mail Group.
- ❑ In 1990 the National Giro Bank was sold to the Alliance & Leicester Building Society.
- ❑ During the 1990s state beneficiaries were encouraged to receive payments by direct credit into their bank accounts.
- ❑ In 2004 paper-based order books were withdrawn and state benefits became payable electronically into bank accounts or a Post Office Card Account.
- ❑ Post Office Ltd lost the BBC contract for the sale of TV licences in 2007.
- ❑ British Telecom introduced a surcharge of £4 on accounts not paid by direct debit in 2007. This surcharge discouraged BT customers from paying telephone accounts at the Post Office.
- ❑ In 2007 the Government instructed Post Office Ltd to close 2,500 branches by the end of 2008, reducing the Network to 11,500 branches.

2. The de-merger of Post Office Ltd (POL) from the Royal Mail Group (RMG):

The independent review on the future of UK postal services – or the Hooper Review, named after its Chair, Sir Richard Hooper – was set up by Business and Enterprise Secretary, John Hutton, MP, in December 2007. Included in the review is a submission from Postcomm, stating “there is a strong case for de-merging POL from RMG, so that each business can focus more attention on their divergent problems”.

The General Secretary of the National Federation of Subpostmasters says “to propose the only de-merger of its kind in the western world without having any ideas on how POL would survive in the future is totally unacceptable”.

3. Full competition in EU postal services by 2011:

The European Parliament has voted to introduce full postal competition across the EU by 2011. The plans aim to guarantee a minimum universal service provision, with every EU citizen having access to postal deliveries and collections at least 5 days a week, and at the same affordable price. National governments will be able to take steps to safeguard or finance their universal service if required.

4. Because of lost revenue the Government is supporting Post Office Ltd with an annual subsidy of £150m. This subsidy will be reviewed in 2011 and will require EU support to continue. Pat McFadden, MP (Minister for Employment Relation and Postal Affairs) has said that, without the annual subsidy, the Network of Post Offices may well be reduced to approximately 3,500 branches.

5. The current Post Office Card Account (POCA) will end in 2010. The Government is due to award the contract for the successor to the Post Office Card Account some time this year. The current Card Account brings in £200m a year to Post Office Ltd. POCA transactions are directly responsible for up to 12% of subpostmasters’ net sub-post office pay, with over quarter of visits to Post Offices made by POCA customers. It is estimated that a further 3,000 Post Office branches will close if POL does not win this contract.

6. How can we secure a viable future for a Network of 11,500 Post Offices?

- ❑ **Encourage the Government to:**
 - **Award the contract for the successor to the Post Office Card Account to Post Office Ltd.**
 - **Award the contract for the issue of ID cards to Post Office Ltd.**
 - **Award contracts for the collection of congestion charges.**
 - **Create a Postbank.**
- ❑ **Encourage local authorities to use the Network more widely.**

Latest news from the Rural Services Network (RSN)

▶ Soaring fuel costs hit rural bus operators

The Government is being urged to use extra revenue from fuel duty to help rural bus operators hit by higher fuel costs. Cumbria County Council is urging the Government to provide a special relief package for bus operators in rural areas. Many rural bus operators have warned that rising fuel prices are making their businesses unviable.

▶ Inquiry to probe post office closures



The National Audit Office is to investigate the Government's handling of plans to close 2,500 post offices. The Post Office's controversial Network Change Programme is part of a Government plan to make the post office network profitable. The inquiry will examine whether communities have been adequately consulted over the closure of hundreds of post office branches.

▶ Rural population rise outstrips cities



Rural areas are experiencing some of England's biggest population increases, suggest figures from the Office of National Statistics. Six rural local authorities are among the top ten places that have seen the greatest

percentage increase in their population within six years. In contrast, the list of places experiencing the biggest percentage decline in population is dominated by urban local authorities.

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Special Development Control Committee meeting

1. establish the main issues facing the District and
2. identify the options which can be pursued through planning policy to help tackle those issues.

The meeting will be split into two parts and all members of the Council are invited to the first part to discuss the report. The second part of the meeting is for the Development Control Committee to formally consider the document with approval being sought before public consultation.

Parish and Town Councils meeting with EDDC - 27 August

We arranged this meeting to give local councils the opportunity to talk about the implications of the Local Government Review. In introducing the event, the Chairman of the Council acknowledged the concerns of the local councils and encouraged them to have their say.

The Boundary Committee was currently consulting with councils and the public on the review of local government in Devon. In July the Boundary Committee came up with its recommendation of a unitary council for Devon, excluding Plymouth and Torbay. This would mean that all existing eight district councils in Devon would be abolished. Genuine concerns were being raised by the public including that a giant unitary council was too large both geographically and in population and that decisions might be made centrally by councillors without local knowledge.

The Leader realised that some of the smaller local councils in particular were unsure about how the Boundary Committee's recommendation would affect them and encouraged them to ask questions. She said that the Council aimed to work even more closely with parish and town councils – she said that East Devon District Council 'recognised and valued local input in decision making'. A clear message from the Leader was 'we are listening to you'. She encouraged local councils to talk with the District Ward Members as this would help to get the local voice heard.

- During the break in the meeting, local food producers showcased their wares giving delegates the opportunity to sample and purchase local produce, direct from the Blackdown Hills.
- At the close of the meeting, delegates told members of the Democratic Service team that they now felt 'better informed, more able to take part in the debate and respond to the Boundary Committee's recommendation'.
- Thanks go to clerks and councillors from Colyton, Exmouth and Sidmouth who actively helped in the planning of this successful event.

In the press

▶ Pensioners outnumber children



New figures from the Office for National Statistics (ONS) show that pensioners outnumber children for the first time and people are living

longer. The fastest growing pensioner group is the over-80s. The pensioner population is projected to grow to more than 12 million within two years. Mervyn Kohler at Help the Aged said that the figures indicated an urgent need to develop the potential of older people or else Britain would end up supporting a costly dependency culture among the elderly.

▶ Bedbug infestation on transport



Rentokil has seen a 40% rise in transport-related infestations over the last year with over two thirds of infestations in public and private transport involving bedbugs.

▶ Photo ID at ballot box to beat poll fraud

Voters may have to take photographic ID into the polling station under proposals to reform the electoral system. A report from the Electoral Commission says the present system needs an urgent overhaul to restore voter confidence.

▶ Office car parks to double as play area



Local authorities should coordinate the after hours use of car parks for children as play areas, according to new guidelines from the National Institute

for Health and Clinical Excellence. A Local Government Association (LGA) spokesman said: "Council leaders have made clear their commitment to tackling obesity and increasing activity levels among children. One of the best ways to improve health is to offer more opportunities for sport and play in general."

▶ Town hall staff given new crimebusting powers

Security guards and town hall workers are being armed with sweeping police-style powers, it has emerged. For a few hundred pounds, state and private sector employees can receive Home Office accreditation. This allows them to hand out fines for a raft of offences, from dropping litter to riding a bike on the pavement. They can also stop cars to check their tax discs, seize alcohol from underage drinkers and demand people's names and addresses. The hope is that they will free up rank-and-file police officers from having to perform these unpopular tasks.



▶ Britain to top EU

Britain will overtake Germany to boast the biggest population in the EU within 50 years, a new report claims. The UK will soar from 61million people to 77million by 2060, a 25 per cent rise.

▶ Treasury keeps £200m in rent

The Treasury will keep nearly £200m of council tenants' rent this year, rather than ploughing it back into building new housing or repairing existing houses. Cllr Paul Bettison from the LGA is quoted: "At a time when more families are finding it difficult to get access to housing, it is unacceptable. This money could be spent building thousands of new council homes for people in genuine need."

▶ Obesity spreads to the south



A new 'fat map' of Britain shows that obesity is becoming as big a problem in parts of the South of Britain as it is in the North. Dr Foster Research, the company that produced the map, said that obesity is becoming more of an issue in outlying areas and is no longer confined to urban areas.

The Department of Health said obesity was the biggest challenge the country faced.

▶ 6% of childcare staff are failing

Increasing numbers of childminders are failing to meet strict standards, Ofsted inspectors have found. The number now stands at six per cent, compared with two per cent in 2006. In contrast, 97 per cent of nursery education is now rated at least satisfactory.

▶ Build new homes on the green belt



The green belt is 'not sacred' and should be built on to provide more affordable housing, a Policy Exchange report proposes.

▶ Number of Eastern Europeans plummets

The number of Eastern Europeans coming to the UK has plummeted, but ONS figures released support councils' calls for extra funding. The LGA has consistently asked the Government to establish a contingency fund for hard-pressed councils.

▶ Ban junk mail companies from getting access to the electoral register



A survey of councils by the LGA and the Association of Electoral Administrators

shows that the vast majority think that direct marketing companies should not have access to the electoral register. By law, councils have to deal with requests from junk mail companies and pass on details from an edited register. Cllr Richard Kemp, Deputy Chairman of the LGA said: "The new survey clearly shows that councils greatly resent having to pass on the electoral register to direct marketing companies. Selling the electoral roll undermines democracy and gives people the impression that the council is profiting from selling their personal information."

▶ Test case for ombudsman

A stand-off between the local government ombudsman and Trafford Council in Manchester is exposing the limits of the ombudsman's powers and prompting calls for rulings to be made enforceable.

▶ Windfall tax on utilities



The energy industry has claimed the public would bear the brunt of a windfall tax, warning there was serious risk of bills going up.

Gordon Brown is under pressure to impose a new levy on energy company profits. The LGA is calling for a national home insulation programme. Town Hall chiefs from all three main parties wrote to six Cabinet ministers arguing a levy would help lift 500,000 people out of fuel poverty, reduce the energy bills of 10 million households by £200 and cut domestic carbon emissions by 20 per cent.

▶ It's a windfall - now share it

A comment piece from Roy Hattersley says that the CBI and Institute of Directors are wrong to say that a 'windfall tax' on energy companies will damage investment prospects. He says that two facts should dominate ministers' consideration of such a tax. First is the size of energy company profits. The second is the extent of fuel poverty.

▶ Councils encouraged to work with business

Councils are to be encouraged to work with businesses after the relaunch of a £150m scheme to encourage new business. LABGI, the Local Authority Business Growth Incentive, has been cut from £600m to £150m over the next three years.

▶ Worries over care in old age



Two-thirds of adults are worried about the future cost of care and accommodation for themselves or elderly relatives, according to new research by three charities. Residential care fees have increased by 51.5% in the past 5 years, and the annual cost of full-time care in the UK could hit £60,000 by 2038.
