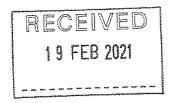

Dear Sir,

The Exmouth Civic Society submits as requested your completed questionnaire on the East Devon Local Plan 2021-2040 Issues and Options. This Plan is, as is not made quite clear, a periodic review of the existing Local Plan of January 2016.

This questionnaire now submitted is subject to this accompanying letter and should in total be taken as our view and comment.

In assessing public consultation on this proposal EDDC should take very strongly into consideration the latests in depth views of the Community that the Plan is prepared to serve. Though this and subsequent consultations will be 'of the minute' they will not be in any way as representative and comprehensive of the Community's views, particularly at Parochial level, as those obtained, some very recently, by the many Neighbourhood Plans researched and drawn up by the Communities themselves. EDDC greatly encouraged the local Communities to take opinion and formulate those plans many of which went back to their Communities with revisions on several occasions. In the case of The Exmouth Neighbourhood Plan the Community was consulted four times with a final referendum approved by 88%.

The basis of this Local Plan revision must therefore reflect most strongly those individual thirty or forty Neighbourhood Plans covering the whole of the remit of EDDC. This will then satisfy the parochial wishes of those living in the EDDC area and give strong pointers to more strategic matters that the Local Plan revision must also address.

In particular the Neighbourhood Plan for Exmouth, one of the largest and in depth plans produced in England, is very specific on certain points, being that:

Any future development must lie within the existing Built up area boundary.

The older age demographic of the Town's population is not a healthy scenario for the future prosperity of a vibrant Community. There should therefore be a more positive emphasis for retaining younger generations to stay in the Town by way of affordable housing and job creation on land designated for Employment purposes. It should not be forgotten that the Exmouth Community College is one of the largest in Europe discharging very many scholars to the world of employment every year. At the same time inward migration of an age no longer in the jobs market should not be encourage by way of more 'Care, Nursing and Sheltered Homes 'and land allocated for Employment must be defended against proposed alternative usage.

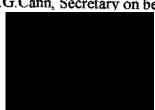

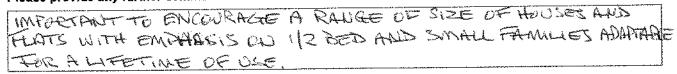
